Monday 5th June is the 50th Anniversary of **World Environment Day**. On Sunday 4th June I read Psalm 8 and said the following ...

World Environment Day is celebrated annually on 5 June. It encourages awareness and action for the protection of the environment. It has been a platform for raising awareness on environmental issues such as pollution, overpopulation, global warming, sustainable development and wildlife crime.

This year the focus is on plastic pollution. Google World Environment Day if you want to know more about it. Of course plastic pollution, while a huge concern, is only one of the climate change related worries.

The disintegration of the Antarctic ice field and the Greenland ice field will create rising sea levels. The impact of that will be millions of Environmental refugees as coastal erosion bites. Sea levels will overflow harbours, destroy infrastructure and so on. Drought will destroy food supplies. There will be an increased risk of forest fire. Thawing Tundra will release Methane and there will be disruption to the Jet Stream.

And so what do we do about it all? Well today I am going to suggest that we turn to Psalm 8 which points out that we are custodians of the earth. It encapsulates the awe and responsibility we carry.

It begins with an exclamation: "O Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth!" That is the essence of our relationship with God and the natural world. Our faith and environmental stewardship are deeply intertwined. Our faith calls us to honour and cherish the earth, recognizing that its abundance is a gift entrusted to our care.

The Psalm calls us to Celebrate God's Creation; value Human Dignity and Responsibility; Harmonize with Nature; Question Human Frailty; and act as Environmental Stewards.

Psalm 8 provides a spiritual foundation for our commitment to environmental stewardship.

On the anniversary of World Environment Day, indeed every day, let us renew our dedication to caring for the planet, promoting justice, and fostering sustainability. Leaving a lasting legacy of love and care for generations to come.

A few weeks back at an evening service in Farnell Church I asked three of the congregation to share their thoughts on Spring. This is what they said

By university education, I'm a scientist, a physicist. So, at one level, for me Spring means that our beautiful home here in the Universe, the planet Earth, is now mid-way between aphelion – when the Earth is furthest from the Sun - and perihelion – when the Earth is closest to the Sun. The 23 degrees tilt of the Earth on its axis means that now, here in the Northern Hemisphere, it is Springtime.

But at a more spiritual level, Spring means for me the song of the Skylark and Ralph Vaughan Williams' eponymous movement The Lark Ascending. It means Spring Barley growing in the field at the front of my home - which may well find its way into the water of the life made at nearby Arbikie Distillery where I work occasionally. Spring means lambing and lambs, and Spring is touched upon metaphorically in the Book of Ecclesiastes, at Chapter 3 which says:

"To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven. A time to be born, and a time to die. A time to plant, and a time to pluck up that which was planted ... [It is] for a man to rejoice, and to do good in his life. And also that every man should eat and drink, and enjoy the good of all his labour. It is the gift of God".

<u>James Potter Reid Drysdale 1932 –2023</u> Minister of Gardner Memorial Church 1978-1999

Jim was born in Edinburgh but he spent the early years of his life on the Island of Orkney. He was a talented pianist from an early age and then one of those life changing events occurred when the organist in the local church took ill and Jim was asked to stand in for one service. The organist never came back and that one service became a regular Sunday commitment leading to Jim helping with the Boys' Brigade. His interest in and commitment to the Church grew and to jump a few years he studied first for an Arts Degree and then a Bachelor of Divinity degree at New College in the University of Edinburgh. Jim's ministerial career taking him first to Fallin in Stirlingshire, a mining village and then to Gardner Memorial. I came to Kirriemuir in 1993 and so Jim was a colleague minister in Angus for around 6 or 7 years. He also did pulpit supply for me in the Angus Glens. In my experience he was a quiet, kind, supportive colleague, who was unpretentious, and in many ways ahead if his time. In Brechin he formed a children's choir who were known as the music makers. He was a Community Councillor and a Children's Panel member in Fallin and Brechin. When he retired he loved driving his VW Beetle.

A man with a sense of humour who had the ability to tell a tale and spin a yarn. Easy going and friendly, with a placid nature. He always saw the best in everybody. Well respected and wise, always cheery, approachable and easy to talk, very much well liked here in the town. Repeatedly described as a lovely man. Jim Drysdale was a gentle man. To my mind he was very much the model of what a Parish Minister should be. Our thoughts and prayers go to his wife Anne & family at this sad time.

FARNELL STONE HOMECOMING

Preliminary discussions have taken place regarding the return of the Farnell Stone to a suitable site within the precincts of Farnell Parish Church. Found in 1849 in the kirkyard by Andrew Jervise, it was thereafter moved to the porch of nearby Kinnaird Castle. In 1865, the stone was donated to Montrose Museum by the then Earl of Southesk. Much later, it was moved to Pictavia on the outskirts of Brechin. On the closure of that exhibition centre it was then transported to an Angus Museums collections store.

We are looking forward to seeing you at our Garden Fete on 9th July, in the garden of Glebe House Strawberries and cream are served with tea or coffee and there is much to do. There is a child's play area, treasure hunt, find the treasure square, croquet, football and rugby and chuck the welly. As this is a working garden, no unaccompanied children please.
